The Opioid Safety Initiative and Veteran Suicides Jan 26 2020 We investigate the relationship between opioid diverting policy and suicides among the veteran population. The opioid epidemic of the past two decades has had devastating health consequences among U.S. veterans and military personnel. We estimate that OSI raised the rural veteran suicide rate by a little over one-third between 2013 and 2018.
